Methodology

The August 2018 Alaska Statewide National Survey was conducted by Harstad Strategic RESEARCH, INC, the national public opinion research firm in Boulder, Colorado. The survey results are based upon 602 random telephone interviews among likely November 2018 voters in the state of Alaska. Sample was obtained using a statewide voter list. Interviews were conducted by live interviewers reaching land lines and cell phones from August 14-20, 2018. A random sample of 602 has a worst-case 95% confidence interval of plus or minus 4.0% about any one reported percentage.
